Instructors will stop pupils at a safe distance before the road. Listen and look for vehicles and escort pupils across whilst standing themselves in the middle of the road. High vis tabards are available on request. Instructors will use the safe crossing places Although traffic is infrequent on this road it is big and in dry weather creates a cloud of dust so stand well back from any traffic 	medium
