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Operating Notes:

- Supervision ratio is 1 instructor to 1 class plus one additional instructor nearby. There is no requirement for an additional adult.
- Instructor to be trained to in-house syllabus. Refresher training as directed by session observations.

Risk – Benefit Statement: During their orienteering adventure, pupils will be making decisions about safest routes to orienteering markers and they will benefit from working as a team to stay safe and together.

Slips, trips, falls. Public & dogs Walking on the reserve	Participants	 Instructor leads the way, pupils walk behind, with member of staff at end of line Pupils told not to talk to public Pupils told not to stroke dogs, we stand still & wait for owner to put dog on lead 	low
Getting Lost Using off site course	Participants	 Teachers of younger pupils should ask for the onsite course Groups of pupils assigned an adult to stay in sight of at all times Boundaries will be explained and an adult or a brightly coloured item will be placed at the far ends of the course Orienteering bag has whistle attached to call the children together 	low
Road Accident Crossing the haul road	All	 Only one of our orienteering courses require pupils to cross the haul road; this is under full supervision on the way to the activity and not 	low

	 part of the course itself The haul road is used by sand lorries and heavy plant machinery going to the working sand quarry. Instructors will stop pupils at a safe distance before the road. Listen and look for vehicles and escort pupils across whilst standing themselves in the middle of the road. High vis tabards are available on request. Instructors will use the safe crossing places Although traffic is infrequent on this road it is big and in dry weather creates a cloud of dust so stand well back from any traffic
Scratches, trips, falls Completing the course Use of orienteering clippers Participants	 Hazards on the course will be pointed out and may include: brambles, low rabbit holes, steep sand banks, gorse, rough or slippery ground Pupils instructed on the appropriate use of clippers
First Aid emergencies	 Take first aid kit Take radio Take whistle and tell pupils what it is for
Weather Conditions	 The lead instructor will review the risk assessment in view of the weather on the day. The instructor will amend activity if ongoing changing weather conditions effect risks

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
